
When emergencies like the Alameda and Obenchain fires happen, there is a lot of

loss. Fred Rogers (Mr. Rogers Neighborhood) was quoted as saying, "When I was a boy and I would see scary things in the news, my mother would say to me, 'Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping.'" It is true. People come out of the woodwork to help during these times. Lesser known is that the volunteers and help often occur before the recipients are ready to receive, and by the time those in need are in a position to be helped, the public's attention has turned elsewhere.

I think God offered Eastwood a tremendous blessing in protecting our homes and businesses. Yet so many of our brothers and sisters were not spared. It looks like over 2300 housing units were destroyed in the last 2 weeks in our county. One report indicated that 80% of the children in the Phoenix school district had their homes burn down. These needs are not going to go away anytime soon. So we will be the helpers that scared children will look for over the next couple of years. I really don't know exactly what that will look like yet, but I am certain that we will be there for those in need.

If you wish to contribute to the deacons fund, know that we are already helping people affected by fires in Oregon. Donations of housing items are being arranged, and hopefully will be timed with the availability of FEMA trailers. Perhaps we will use the East Lot to provide space for people to park trailers while they rebuild. God Bless you all!

i once was **blind** but now i **see**

mark 8:22-26

They came to Bethsaida, and some people brought a blind man and begged Jesus to touch him. He took the blind man by the hand and led him outside the village. When he had spit on the man's eyes and put his hands on him, Jesus asked, "Do you see anything?"

He looked up and said, "I see people; they look like trees walking around." Once more Jesus put his hands on the man's eyes. Then his eyes were opened, his sight was restored, and he saw everything clearly.

MARK 8:22-25, NIV

"I can see clearly now ... " The buoyant melody and infectious lyrics of Johnny Nash's 1972 chart-topping song echo through the back of my mind as I reflect on Jesus' healing of a blind man at Bethsaida.

Like many of those Jesus encountered, this man met Jesus not through his own initiative, but through friends who cared and saw in the itinerate rabbi a spark of hope for their friend. If only they could lead him to the place of encounter, if only they could get him close enough that Jesus could reach out and touch him, then perhaps there was hope. Just maybe their friend could, and would, see.

Jesus, though, was not a public showman. He took the man by the hand and led him out of the village, to a quiet and private place where he could attend more intimately to the man's need. He first spit in the man's eyes and applied his touch, then asked if he saw anything. Indeed, the man could now see people, but his vision was not clear-the people appeared "like trees." In this case, the miracle happened in two stages-it took a second touch from Jesus to transform the man's eyes.

We live in a fast-paced culture that prefers the immediate over the prolonged, the event over the process, the destination to the exclusion of the journey. We visit "fast food" restaurants and prepare "instant" meals at home, expect not only next day but same day delivery, and access libraries of information with the click of a mouse or touch of a link in our smartphones.

This story of Jesus healing the man at Bethsaida reminds us that genuine transformation oftenprobably most often-happens over time rather than in an instant. Just as it took both an initial and then a second touch from Jesus to restore the blind man's sight fully, making disciples of Jesus involves both leading persons to an initial commitment to Christ ("baptizing them") and ongoing formation in the way of following Jesus ("teaching them to observe," Matthew 28:18-20).

International Ministries' global servants, staff, and volunteers work cross-culturally to invite people to become disciples of Jesus. This involves leading individuals toward making an initial life commitment to Christ, and then supporting the ongoing transformation of individuals and communities by "proclaiming through word and deed God's reign of justice, peace, and abundant life for all creation." IM's ministries touch whole persons and whole communities, engaging body and spirit, toward the wholeness that comes from fullness of life in Christ.

Your support of IM in prayer, encouragement, and giving makes possible amazing transformative work around the globe, from ministries of evangelism and discipleship to work in health and wellness, abolition of global slavery, peace and justice, and more. In all of this, we work toward the vision of a time when God's will is done fully "on earth as it is in heaven." That will most assuredly be a "bright, bright sunshiny day!"





The Call to Prayer event for anti-racism was held on August 5, 2020 with over 150 participants. A dozen American Baptists participated in the Call to Prayer by sharing their prayers and reflections on anti-racism.

Following the Call to Prayer, ABCUSA President Karen Podsiadly designed an application process for persons interested in serving on the task force. To date, 37 persons have applied to serve on the task force.

Due to the great number of applicants, three groups are being formed in addition to a task force. The three subgroups will help to identify anti-racism resources for individuals, congregations, and institutions as their overall work is guided by the task force.

Eastwood Reopening Protocols

The country is going to slowly reopen, and that includes our church. Following are the guidelines for the reopening. We will re-evaluate the COVID-19 situation in the fall and make any appropriate changes or adjustments at that time. Our primary concern is to keep everyone safe and healthy. If, for any reason, you do not feel comfortable returning to the physical building, do not come. We want you all to be safe, healthy and at peace. To that end, we will continue to have the services available through Facebook streaming live each week.

Our initial opening will be limited to the Sunday morning worship service. The church doors will not open for seating until 10:15 am.

Worship Service

We have space to seat about 80 in the sanctuary and another 8-10 in the foyer, maintaining physical distancing. Because our typical attendance is around 80-85 we expect to able to accommodate all who would like to attend.

To maintain physical distancing, the following steps will be followed:

The two sets of double doors leading into the foyer will be propped open.

You are asked to wait outside of the building until you are led in by an usher.

- You will be asked to us the hand-sanitizing station as you come through the door.
- We know that most parishioners have places they like to sit but in order to maintain distancing and avoid unnecessary passing we ask that you bear with us during this time and graciously sit where you are directed.
- Each member or family group will be led in to the sanctuary and shown where to sit. The sanctuary will be filled from front to back.
- At the end of the service you will be escorted by an usher from your pew out of the building. The sanctuary will be emptied from back to front. If you wish to visit you can do so out side but please maintain 6 feet of distance between you.

We will require that everyone wear a face mask. We ask that you provide your own if possible. However, we will have disposable masks available for anyone that needs one.

At this stage we will not have: Greeters, Communion, Choir, the Cookie/Fellowship time following the service, or adult Sunday morning classes. Mid-week and Wednesday night services, meals, and Bible studies are also on hold. Singing will be done with masks in place.

Offering: We will not pass the collection plates. Instead you will find a locked collection box attached to the wall in the foyer.

Restrooms: Restroom doors will be propped open to eliminate the need to touch the door handles. Ladies, we have covered the site-lines in to the restroom with a banner.

Sanitize and disinfect the church building:

Before Initial Opening: The church facilities have all been spray sanitized.

Ongoing: Arrangements will be made to have the facilities sanitized between services.

Areas to be included:

Pews, chairs, visitor center/kiosk

Doorknobs, handles, sanitation dispensers, offering box, and other high touch areas

There will be no bulletins and pew Bibles and hymnals will be removed from the sanctuary for the time being. All songs, scripture readings, etc. will be displayed on the screens.

Children's programs: There will be no Children's Sunday School, Children's Church or Nursery for the time being. Children will attend the main worship service with their parents and/or other family members. The Pastor and worship team are attempting to make the service accessible for the younger kids.
